National Cycle Route (Lôn Las Cymru) and Ysgol Treborth

Thank you for your letter of 27th November, 1998 regarding the above.

You will be aware that since my letter of 20th December, 1996 to your predecessor, Ms Sue Walton, the circumstances surrounding Ysgol Treborth have changed, and that concerns have been expressed regarding the general safety of the resident pupils.

The school, in co-operation with the Authority, has undertaken a programme aimed at securing the property's boundaries and of restricting access on to the site by the public. The clear worry now felt regarding the routing of Lôn Las Cymru on to the school grounds is that the aims of the policy recently adopted for the school will be undermined.

I regret therefore, that I cannot at present comply with your request to confirm the agreement set out in my letter of December, 1996. I hope, however, that some way may be found which allows the project to proceed, but which also allows the legitimate concerns regarding the safety of the school to be met. If I can be of any assistance I should be grateful if you would contact Mr Iwan Roberts of this department to discuss the matter further.



Following your visit to discuss the situation with the governors, I would like to respond on their behalf with the following comments which reflect points made over a year ago.

- 1. Over the past year the school has progressed to protect their borders with security grants through the Welsh Office. That is, deliberately proceeding to block access by erecting fences and gates in order to block public access to the school grounds.
- 2. This reflects similar movements on the grounds of the majority of schools nationally. At the moment public transit is taking place and the school is moving to reduce it. Giving a public right of way on the outskirts of a special residential school can cause more trouble when inviting suspicious strangers to leave the premises.
- 3. Access to the school grounds close to a railway track would likely facilitate access for our pupils to a dangerous area and could facilitate another way for them to run away. However safe it is claimed that the route can be protected from the railway there are still obvious weak points.
- 4. Because several difficulties have arisen with the route in the Treborth area, I wonder if it is possible to direct the Lon Las along the main road between the Antelope Hotel and the village of Treborth.





History

Our site was developed as a pleasure garden by the Chester and Holyhead Railway Company in the 1840s. The garden was laid out with Cascade, Lime Avenue, and other features, to the design of Sir Joseph Paxton of Crystal Palace fame. It was to be part of Britannia Park, a Victorian extravaganza with Grand Hotel, conservatories and station on the main railway line. But due to funding problems, the whole scheme was abandoned and the site reverted to pasture and woodland.



There have been significant changes in the woodland quarter of the Garden over winter with further clearance of Rhododendron and Cherry Laurel and some necessary thinning for conservation and safety plus the laying down of the latest section of the Coastal Footpath for Wales. The new path has been laid on top of the existing main woodland track running parallel with the Strait and now with a much drier, robust surface of microgranite chippings from Penmaenmawr. There is wheelchair access for over half of its length and with the removal of invasive shrubs welcome views across the Strait. The aim is to provide a few look out points and

some discrete interpretation of the wildlife and historic interest of the area. A brand new path now threads its way through the wooded section alongside the eastern end of the drive down to the lodge thereby directing pedestrians away from the drive, which of course can be busy with traffic at times. This welcome addition to the path network through Treborth will stimulate efforts to transform a somewhat derelict quarter of the Botanic Garden into a useful and attractive lower arboretum providing an attractive visual experience at the Garden's main entrance.

A small car park is being added half way up the drive to service the coastal footpath.

All of this woodland and pathway work has been overseen by Gerry Downing on an almost day to day basis during the last 3 months, a great effort and one of the single most influential changes to Treborth in the last 50 years – well


